Lender

A bank, credit union, savings & loan association, or other financial institution that provides funds to the student or parent for an educational loan.

Loan

A type of financial aid which must be repaid, with interest. Federal student loan programs are a good method of financing the costs of your college education as they have lower, fixed interest rates, do not require a credit check, and provide a variety of deferment options and extended repayment terms.

Master Promissory Note (MPN)

A binding legal document that must be completed (visit www.StudentAid.gov) by the student borrower before loan funds are disbursed by the lender. The MPN represents an agreement by the borrower to repay the debt according to the specified terms and conditions (repayment schedule, interest rate, fees, deferments, forbearances, etc.) The student should keep this document until the loan has been repaid.

Glossary of Terms for Financial Aid Offers

The Glossary of Terms for Financial Aid Offers was created in 2012 by NASFAA's Award Notification Task Force, and updated in 2019 after consultation with NASFAA membership, the NASFAA Board of Directors, and members of the higher education community, to more accurately reflect the current financial aid environment. It contains universally accepted definitions of language typically contained on financial aid offers given to current and prospective students by colleges and universities. The intent of this glossary is:

- To provide colleges community-defined and accepted definitions of common terms used on institutional financial aid offers
- To provide greater clarity and understanding by students through consistency in the use and meaning of terms on financial aid offers across all colleges and universities
- To allow prospective students to more easily compare information from multiple schools because terms used have common definitions

Georgia State's Journey to Simplicity

- Examined communications = prospective student admissions through continuing student financial aid.
- Including email, text messaging, website, social media, phone calling, etc.
- Takeaways:
 - Messaging was not consistent from admissions to financial aid.
 - Messaging too complex.
 - How did we know? Student feedback and behavior.



Readability and College Students

- Grade-level readability measures
 - Measures difficulty of sentence structure and word choice; produces a grade-level of reading comprehension required to read text.
- Used extensively by U.S. Department of Defense (Carver, 1974; Fry, 1986; Johnson, 1972; Kniffin, 1979; McClure, 1987; Sticht, 1970; Sticht & Zapf, 1976).
- Average U.S. resident = 7th-grade reading level (Clear Language Group, 2018)
- Only 37% of high school graduates read at the 12th-grade level in the United States (National Assessment Governing Board, 2020).
- A lot of material in higher education is unreadable by its intended audience (students and support networks).
 - Financial aid communication ranging from 12th to 19th-grade English reading comprehension levels.
- Most prospective and current U.S. college students cannot read and comprehend financial aid communication.

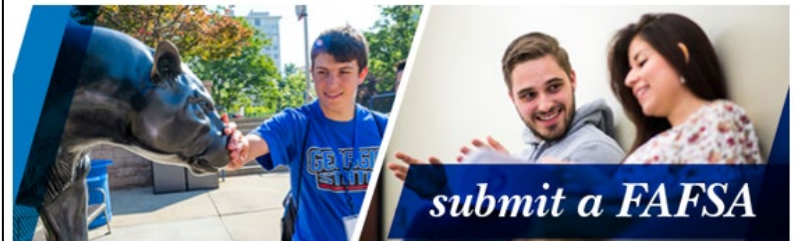

A Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) evaluation has been performed on your academic record and the results are:

- You are not meeting at least one of the SAP standards. All students must meet the standards defined in the [Satisfactory Academic Progress Policy](#): GPA, 66.66% pace of completion, and maximum timeframe.
- Students who fail to comply with these standards lose their eligibility to receive federal and state financial aid [aid](#).

SAP APPEAL

You have the ability to appeal for reinstatement of your financial aid. If you had a mitigating circumstance beyond your control that affected your ability to meet SAP standards, you may an appeal. To appeal for reinstatement of aid, you must complete a Georgia State University SAP appeal and submit supporting documentation. The documentation must be directly related to the events that affected your ability to meet SAP standards. You may obtain the appeal online at the Georgia State University [financial aid forms](#) webpage.

Submitting an appeal does not guarantee approval. If your appeal is not approved or you do not have a mitigating circumstance, you must pay for your next term of enrollment and improve your academic progress standing.

We encourage you to contact the University Advisement Center at the campus you attend to discuss your educational plans. Have a great semester.

Best Practices for Financial Aid Communication

- Consider each level of the funnel.
- Embed contact information into every mode of communication.
- Minimize jargon, acronyms, and sentence length.
- Assume unfamiliarity.
- Assume an 8th grade level of reading comprehension ability.
- Use graphics to cut text but maintain ADA compliance.
